DARWIN SHIP LIFT FACILITY

Project Bulletin November 2024

The Northern Territory Government is delivering the Ship Lift to establish Darwin as a thriving maritime services industry hub.

The Ship Lift will establish Darwin as a key maritime maintenance centre in Northern Australia and servicing South East Asia, and will capitalise on the Territory's strategic position in the Asia Pacific region.

The Defence industry is a key stakeholder and potential future user of the Ship Lift Facility to support naval operations in Northern Australia.

Below is an update on how the Darwin Harbour Infrastructure Project (DHIP) team is continuing to progress the Darwin Ship Lift Facility project.

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Local contract for PCM Group

Local Territory business PCM Group has been awarded a contract to paint and blast sheet piles that will be used to construct the Darwin Ship Lift Facility.

As specialists in blasting, protective coatings and maintenance, the local company will blast and paint approximately 2700 sheet piles that will interlock together to build the caissons that form the seawalls for the Ship Lift Facility.

PCM Group Director Gemma Mackett started the company in Darwin in 2015 and has worked on a number of major projects, including for the INPEX Ichthys LNG project, Rio Tinto and multiple marine and Defence projects.

Gemma said the sheet pile contract, which was awarded through J Steel, was a major win locally for the business that has carved out a reputation specialising in abrasive blasting, protective coatings, rubber lining, insulation, cladding, sheet metal work, maintenance and industrial cleaning.

"The contract means we can cement employment for our Territory workers." Gemma said. "It is very beneficial for us to be working on this project and to see it through from the initial stages to construction."

"It is a great opportunity for our employees to work on a project of this scale and show the quality of our work to the local and international markets."

The company, which has expanded to Western Australia and Queensland, is committed to employing local people and currently has 14 Territorians working on the sheet piles contract in its yard at East Arm, including 2 trainees and 2 Indigenous employees.

PCM Group started the contract in October 2024 and it will take six months to complete with multiple deliveries of sheet piles to be received throughout the program.
